Allora In Brief .... Allora is known as 'The Best and Friendliest Little Town on the Downs'. The town nestles beside Dalrymple Creek just off the New England highway between Toowoomba and Warwick.

Some may well think they are taking a trip into history when driving down the main street, a street described by one travel writer as 'one of the three best

streetscapes in Australia'. Make sure you visit David's Saint Anglican Church built in 1888, and reputably one of the finest examples of a timber church in country Queensland.

Allora is located

158 kilometres west of Brisbane and has a strong sense of history. A signed heritage trail takes walkers from one historic building to the next, street banners reflect the theme, and a series of murals at the gates of the showground depict local milestones. The town was the childhood home of P.L Travers who wrote the Mary Poppins stories, and the Fallen Soldier's Memorial is one of only two Boer War memorials in Queensland.

Also of interest is Glengallan Homestead and Heritage Centre. Now restored, it embodies the history of the

Allora region since the late 19th Century. A major draw-card on the Heritage Building Trail, Glengallan divulges a fascinating insight into the workings of a pastoral station.

The region surrounding Allora, a farming community, was first explored by Europeans in the 1840s; the town was surveyed in 1859. Its name is believed to

derive an **Aboriginal** word 'Gnarrallah' meaning waterhole or swampy place.

Allora Post Office opened on 31 March 1863. The Allora State School opened on 1 May 1867. On 31 December 2008, renamed Allora State

School. In 1886 the first fossil evidence of early human occupation in the area, the 'Talgai Skull', was found on Talgai Homestead embedded in the wall of Dalrymple Creek. Radiocarbon dating suggests the Talgai skull is between 9,000 and 11,000 years old. It is believed to be the skull of a boy of approximately 15 years of age who had been killed by a massive blow to the side of the head. From the 1870s, red cedar, pine and beech logged from the Goomburra valley

were milled at Allora. The 2016 census revealed a



population of 1,223 people.


A friend introduced me to the Balmain Tigers; I have been Balmain Tiger girl ever since.

<u>'Glengallen Homestead and Heritage Centre...'</u> Restored from ruin in 2001, the iconic Glengallan Glengallan Homestead, built 1867-1868, is located House emerges from the ruins of the 1867 on the southwestern slope of Mount Marshall at sandstone mansion as

the mouth of a wide valley, running west from Cunningham's Gap, near the junction of the Cunningham and New England Highways approximately 15 kilometres north of Warwick.

In 1885, Glengallan covered 42,000 acres (17,000 ha), and from 1896 to 1904, Glengallan was progressively broken-up into smaller units. After the

original leases had expired in the 1860s, lease holders were permitted to acquire large areas by pre-emptive claim and further purchases.

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Re-live experience. Glengallan story from squattocracy to farmer settlement through an innovative interpretation that allows the place to tell its own story. Glengallan is an exceptional venue for day trippers, tour school visits, reunions, weddings, workshops, seminars, markets and

The aim is to prepare the fabric for producing a table runner of one of our future sewing classes.



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#### Our Pet Policy ....

This Policy applies to all members, visitors and guests whilst at a rally site for the entire duration of the rally, i.e., upon arrival on site and until departure. This Policy runs in conjunction with any other pet policy imposed by the venue at which our rally is being held.

It must be remembered that although many of us enjoy pets, not all club members are pet lovers. However, if we abide by a few simple rules, there is no reason why we cannot all be happy and have a harmonious rally environment. Refer to the By-Law No. 19 for further details.

It is important to be aware that:

- Pet owners/carers are responsible for keeping their pets quiet at all times.
- Barking dogs will not be tolerated as this can be disturbing to others.
- Pets must be restrained and kept within the confines of the owner/carer's caravan/ annex.
- Pets are to be kept on a short leash or other type of restraint at all times.
- When walking a pet, it must be on a short leash or other type of restraint and be in the hands of a responsible adult.
- A pet must not be off its leash anywhere on the rally site. The only exception being
  if a specific area designated for this purpose is provided by the venue.

Pets are not permitted in the following areas:

- Where food is eaten, prepared and/or served.
- Toilet/shower facilities.
- The hall or meeting area.
- Happy hour. The only exception being where happy hour is being held under a
  member's caravan awning and it is at the discretion of the caravan owner as to
  whether a pet is permitted.
- Pet owners/carers must clean-up after their pet/s.

If a member is attending a rally with a pet, the rally marshal is to be advised on arrival.

To achieve a score, the dice, when thrown, must revolve at least twice in the air or on the ground, before coming stationary on the floor and the dice must lay on the floor with one side completely flat on the floor. If not, the referee calls "Cocky Die" and the throw is made again.

If the dice show a six, then the thrower is entitled the opposing teams to prevent them cheating. to a second throw and can continue until there is not a six showing after a throw. Before a counter

can be placed on the board, a six has to be showing. Thus four sixes are required to get all four counters on the board. SIMPLE TACTICS: Get all four counters onto the board. Try and keep them grouped together by leap-frogging counters, and wherever possible, keep a 'blob' at the rear of the group.
